Taxpayer Alert: State Agency (LAFCo) Proposes Area Police, Fire, Sanitation and Highlands Recreation Districts Be Moved to Cash-Strapped City of San Mateo

The Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCo) http://www.co.sanmateo.ca.us/portal/site/lafco is a state-mandated, independent agency with county-wide jurisdiction over changes in organization and boundaries of cities and special districts, including annexations, detachments, incorporations and formations. Its responsibilities also include "to establish and periodically update spheresof influence--future boundary, organization, and service plans--for the county's cities and special districts."

LAFCo executive officer Martha Poyatos sent a report dated February 4, 2013 to area community associations recommending annexation of our special districts into budget—challenged City of San Mateo. She has called a meeting to deliver the report to area communities on Wednesday, February 20, at 7 p.m. in the Highlands Elementary School LGI room.

In December 2012, County Service Area Number

One (CSA 1) communities of our area (Highlands-Baywood-Oaks) officially notified the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors that LAFCo has shown a pattern of writing inadequately analyzed reports about our area community services. To date, the LAFCo office has ignored our specific written requests to follow due process for involvement of area communities, including advance notice and information to every tax-payer.

All of our neighbors need to attend this meeting to learn more about this effort that would irreversibly change the services we pay taxes for and our community's quality of life. Keep taxpayer demand for government accountability strong. Help maximize services and minimize taxes.

Please attend the meeting so we may preserve our county sanitation, police, fire, and Highlands recreation Districts.

February HCA Meeting Speaker:

interesting because Steve Dupré, a project manager working with the San Mateo County Sheriff's office and the Information Services Department on a public safety radio project, will be explaining the project and looking for input about it from our community. The project includes placing additional equipment, including an antenna tower, on an existing site just west of the Youth Services Center. That site is part of a countywide public safety radio network that supports radio communication for first responders throughout the county. We'll get detailed information and have a chance to ask questions and comment at our HCA meeting on February 26 at 7:30 p.m. in the Rec Childcare Center Multipurpose Room.

LAFCo: As the January *lowdown* described, the HCA has been working with nearby neighborhoods in County Service Area 1 (CSA 1) and the HRD to respond to LAFCo's review of the various providers of services to district residences. (Copies of the January *lowdown* can be found at the Rec office). We pressed the commission to include CSA 1 residents' reponses to their report in their process and they've set up a public meeting with CSA 1 residents, but with very short notice. It will take place on February 20, at 7 p.m. in the Highlands School LGI Room. See page 1 of this *lowdown* for more information.

San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (PUC): As you probably know, our nearby Crystal Springs lakes and dam are part of the San Francisco Hetch Hetchy water system operated by the San Francisco PUC. At our March HCA meeting, we'll be hearing from a PUC staff member who will bring us up to date on the progress of their projects at the lakes and dam. The county can't get started rebuilding the closed section of Skyline Blvd. until the

work at the dam is finished.

Join the HCA: We kick off our HCA membership drive this month, and the meetings and issues mentioned in this message describe some of the important work of our organization. The annual Highlands 3rd of July fireworks and 4th of July celebration are more of the HCA's work and a pleasure for the whole community. HCA Meeting, Jan. 22, 2013

- **I.** Call to Order The meeting was called to order by President Rick Priola at 7:33 p.m.
- II. Review and Approval of the Minutes A motion to approve the minutes of Nov 23, 2012, was moved by Wil Pinney, seconded by James Goodman, and carried unanimously.

III. Sheriff's Department/ California Highway Patrol/CDF

The Sheriff reported that a car left running without supervision was stolen on Monticello. Residents continue to request assistance with the crossing at Lexington and Newport. Cal Fire reported a total of 88 calls made to Station 17 since December 20. A partial list includes 6 structure fires, 36 calls for medical assistance, 28 calls to cover other stations (of which 16 were out to the coast).

A countywide push for fire prevention will occur in April. A CPR course will be offered on January 30, 2013, and a first-aid course will be offered in February. CERT training will commence on February 21, 2013, at 6 p.m. at Station 17. Residents are encouraged to attend. Groups that need float assistance for the 4th of July parade should contact Scott.ernest@fire.ca.gov

IV Reports

A. First Vice President – Liesje Nicolas reported that the HRD continues to explore solutions to park-



ing and congestion. HRD will be speaking with neighboring residents concerning these issues. A new fee structure has been instituted to allow residents of CSA 1 to benefit from reduced fees.

A report on the December 19 LAFCO meeting announced that the review of the HRD has been moved to next March 20. The LAFCO Commission stated that they would listen to the community, and Supervisors Pine and Horsley stated that they would not consider annexation to the City of San Mateo without polling CSA 1 residents.

Two reviews are expected from LAFCo: an HRD review and a Crystal Springs Sanitation District review, though the sanitation review has disappeared from the agenda. Brigitte Shearer added that the 50 letters from Highlands residents to the LAFCo commission made an impact on the commission.

- **B. Second Vice President** JP Bernard announced that he was planning a meeting for July 3rd and 4th festivities chairs. Highlands residents are encouraged to participate by volunteering.
- **C. Treasurer** David Krakower presented the final 2012 budget; the proposed 2013 budget will be presented at the February 2013 meeting.

San Mateo and Half Moon Bay, bisects the Watershed between Upper and Lower Crystal Springs Reservoirs. Other roads adjacent to the Watershed include Edgewood Road to the south and Skyline

Boulevard to the east.

In addition to their primary uses for water collection, water storage, and water quality protection, the Peninsula Watershed lands serve as a State Fish and Game Refuge and are designated by the California Department of Forestry as a hazardous fire area. A Scenic Easement (19,000 acres) and a Scenic and Recreation Easement (4,000 acres) established through a four-party agreement between us, the U.S. Department of the Interior, Caltrans, and San Mateo County, also overlay the Watershed. The Watershed is also home to the historic Pulgas Water Temple.


San Mateo County Event Center on Saturday, January 26. Firearms were surrendered, with no questions asked, in return for \$100 in cash per hand gun, shotgun, or rifle, and up to \$200 cash for an assault weapon.

San Mateo County Sheriff Greg Munks stated, "The overall purpose of the gun buyback program is to make the streets of San Mateo County safer for those who live and work here. There are many unwanted and unsecured guns in households throughout the county. We are providing a place for people to come and dispose of them and get some money in return. We feel this will improve public safety in our

county."

Over 680 firearms, including 24 assault weapons, were turned in, and \$63,500 was paid out during the event.

Among the weapons surrendered were 30-round and 100-round capacity magazines, which are illegal to sell in California. A high-capacity shotgun, also known as a "street sweeper," was also surrendered and removed from the community.

Multifaith Volunteers Benefit Needy and Themselves

Imagine a Muslim, a Jew, a Mormon, and a Presbyterian on their knees together. What on earth are they doing? They are assembling new metal bookcases for an elementary school storage room. They were among the almost 200 volunteers from 14 different faiths who worked together on Martin Luther King Day to build friendships and serve the community.

One project that absorbed close to 100 volunteers was at Belle Air School in San Bruno. Many families, including several from the Highlands, spent the day there. They built sturdy and safe new shelves for a large overflowing storeroom. A dingy cafeteria was repainted in bright colors. The preschool play area was cleaned up with fresh dirt in repaired planters. Because it was sunny, dozens of workers of all ages completely trimmed, weeded, and raked the landscaping. Between discards from the storeroom and waste from the garden, a huge dumpster donated by Recology was filled to the top.

The day started with a breakfast for all, and then volunteers spread out to four different projects. In addition to the school refurbishment, lunch was served to residents at the Safe Harbor homeless shelter in South San Francisco, over 1,000 donated children's books were sorted and delivered to schools, and 61 large boxes of warm clothes for Syrian refugees were assemble.

Monday's event was sponsored by the Peninsula Multifaith Coalition, which includes Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, Congregation Beth Jacob, Congregational Church of Belmont, First Presbyterian Church of Burlingame, Jewish Community Relations Council, Pacifica Institute, Peninsula Sinai Congregation, Peninsula Temple Beth El, Peninsula Temple Sholom, St. Bartholomew Parish, St. Matthias Catholic Church, St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Shinnyoen Foundation of Redwood City and the Yaseen Foundation of Belmont.

The first-ever Multifaith day of service was such a success that the Peninsula Multifaith Coalition is already planning to repeat its summertime potluck and then organize a second day of service in January 2014.
