LAFCo Report Generates Concern in the Highlands and CSA1

With over 150 attending during a holiday week, County Service Area 1 (CSA1) residents showed their concern about the inadequate LAFCo office reports on our local district services. Residents were sent a notice less than two weeks before the state of California held a meeting at the Highlands School about our district tax structure on February 20. Residents and representatives of CSA1 questioned the report composed of general comments recommending annexation of our area independent districts, including the Highlands Recreation District, to the City of San Mateo. The report claimed in vague generalities that bigger is always better for our local districts.

Annexation would mean the loss of control or influence over services that are today addressing our communities' very specific needs. The loss would only make sense if there was a proven significant reduction in the cost of the services to our residents. The LAFCo

report not only doesn't evidence any savings in delivering the services, it also doesn't explain how potential savings would translate to cost reduction for CSA1 residents. The LAFCo report's pledge for annexation as a blank check from our area communities is therefore not acceptable. It is critical that our residents express their opposition to the report, and/or their support of our current specific community-controlled services. Failure to do so could lead to interpretation that the report is acceptable.

Please plan to attend the Local Area Formation Commission (LAFCo) meeting about our CSA1 local district services at 2 p.m. on March 20, in the Board of Supervisors chambers at the County Government Center in Redwood City. If you cannot attend, please send your comments to water-tankhill@yahoo.com

LAFCo: Recently it's been a very busy time for the Highlands and the HCA. I want to thank all the Highlands residents who attended the LAFCo meeting on February 20. Together with residents of the other neighborhoods in County Service District 1 (CSA1), they

raised questions and described their concerns with the LAFCO report about the districts serving the Highlands and CSA1, especially with what seems to be their leaning to annexation. Sam Naifeh's article on page one of this *lowdown* details the reasons for these concerns and reminds us to attend the next LAFCo meeting on March 20 at 2 p.m. at the Board of Supervisors Chambers in Redwood City. We need to have a good showing at that meeting too. Sam's article also has information about where to send comments, if you can't attend the meeting.

Public Safety: During the last week of February there were three burglaries in the Highlands. Other nearby neighborhoods have also experienced break-ins and burglaries. Most of the Highlands homes were entered by glass doors being pried open, or front doors being smashed. There have also been recent car burglaries. The Sheriff's Deputies who attend the HCA meeting have often told us to make sure not to leave valuables in our cars, and keep our home and car doors locked. But there's more we can do.

The crooks aren't stupid. They want to do their crimes when nobody's at home, and knocking on doors to see if anybody answers is the way some of them find out. So we need to keep our eyes open. We need to get to know our neighbors and recognize their cars, their family, and the people who work for them. We need to trim overgrown bushes that might provide cover for crooks. When we see someone or something that seems suspicious, the deputies who provide our police services tell us to call the Sheriff's office at 363-4911. We are

urged not to confront any suspicious person ourselves and to call 911 if we think a crime is taking place.

Radio Tower Project: At the February HCA meeting, Steve Dupré, a project manager working with the San Mateo County Sheriff's office and the Information Services Department on a public safety radio project, came to our meeting to get the Highlands reaction to a plan to relocate an 80-foot radio tower that has to be moved from its current location in Skylawn cemetery. Their plan is to move it to a location near the Youth Services Center. Residents had several concerns about the project and made their points well.

HCA Meeting February 26, 2013,

I. Call to Order – The meeting was called to order by President Rick Priola at 7:33 p.m.

II. Review and Approval of the Minutes – James Goodman requested a modification to the January 2013 minutes: the reported pipeline completion should have read "gas pipeline" not "water pipeline. A motion to approve the modified minutes of Jan 22, 2013, was moved by JP Bernard, seconded by James Goodman, and carried unanimously.

III. Sheriff's Department/ California Highway Patrol/CDF -

Cal Fire reported that a total of 61 calls were made to Station 17, the majority being medical calls.

IV. Reports

A. First Vice President – Liesje Nicolas reported that the Highlands Recreation District (HRD) has a new Board President, Michelle McNeil, and Vice President, Pam Merkadeau. The HRD held a meeting concerning the Rec's parking situation and plan to hire a traffic consultant. The Rec also plans to respond to the report made to the County LAFCo Commission.

B. Second Vice President – JP Bernard reported on the recent meeting for the 3rd – 4th July festivities. A replacement for the public address/music portion of the event is needed. Dianne Weitzel is working on the parade and welcomes nomi-

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nations for the Grand Marshal as well as suggestions for this year's theme.

A resolution was proposed to formally thank County Supervisor Dave Pine for his support of the Highlands. Additionally, the group also thanked Bob Gutierrez for his many years of service to the HCA providing the PA and music for the 3rd and 4th of July.

- C. Treasurer David Krakower presented the 2013 budget; JP Bernard moved to approve the budget. James Goodman seconded the motion, and it was carried unanimously.
- **D. Membership** Kim Nations announced that the Area Reps will begin going door to door for the membership drive.
- **E.** *lowdown* **Dorothy Greene** announced that the March *lowdown* deadline is March 1.

F. Public Utilities Committee –

Steve Dupuis from the County Public Safety group addressed the HCA concerning a proposed 80-foot radio tower placed next to the Youth Center. The radio tower is essential to the County emergency services. The current tower is located at Skylawn Cemetery. The tower must be moved from this location because

The LAFCo final report to the County Board is scheduled for March 20. JP Bernard commented that it does not seem that the LAFCo report benefits Highlands residents and may be a push for annexation to the City of San Mateo. Sam Naifeh proposed a resolution that the HCA draft a letter formally stating that our neighborhood does not want any change in service; we do not want to

lose the service of the HRD, County Sheriff, or County Fire, and we do not want our 3rd – 4th July celebrations to end. JP Bernard seconded the resolution and it was passed unanimously.

VI. New Business/ Announcements

Because of the passage in last November's election of Measure B, which amended the county charter to require that supervisors be elected by district rather than by an at-large vote of the entire county, the Board of Supervisors has begun a process of reexamining current district lines and considering whether district changes are necessary.

There will be five public hearings on this matter from now through October 8. Applicants are sought from the public for membership on the redistricting committee. **VII. Adjournment** – The meeting was adjourned at 9:05 p.m.

LAFCo Review Draws Attention Back to Sewer Overbilling

Because of erroneous volume meter readings, CSA1 residents have been overbilled for years for sewage transport and treatment. The wrongful billing was uncovered three to four years ago and officially confirmed two years ago with the implementation of a new meter. CSA1 associations have worked with San Mateo County Department of Public Works, operating in this instance as the Crystal Springs Sanitation District agent, to recover overcharges. This currently is unresolved.

By drawing residents' attention to the services provided by the Crystal Springs Sanitation District, the contested LAFCo review of CSA1 County services revealed that no progress has been made over recent months to repair the financial prejudice. Reparation should be expected at two levels:

- correct the current and past billings
- agree to reset fee levels based on accurate meter readings.

Wishing to step up our efforts and focus on correct sanitation billing, I have, as HCA President, created a task-force that will work with other CSA1 homeowners associations and be the channel of communication with the Sanitation District for the HCA. Members of the task force are: myself (Rick Priola), Sam Naifeh and JP Bernard. Its members will also seek support and advice from Cary Wiest, former HCA president, who initiated discussion on overpayment with the Sanitation District, and will identify appropriate means to defend residents' interests.

Progress reporting and recommendations will be presented at HCA monthly board meetings.

Bees are Busy Making Local Honey Here

The sweetest man in the Highlands is Oliver Frank. At least he makes the sweetest product with his local, unfiltered honey. I went to interview him because of the delicious honey, but I found a treasure of history, house tips, horticulture, health, and humor. Oliver, who moved to the

Highlands in 1970, has been a beekeeper for 40 years because he wanted to work outdoors and make a product that is healthful. He also has a landscaping business.

Oliver grew up in Hillsborough in the Frank Lloyd Wright house that Eichler had rented for two years. After attending San Mateo High School and Urban School in San Francisco, he studied horticulture as CSM. With the experience of living in the prototype, Oliver wanted only an Eichler home. He added a second story for his son Adrian from his first marriage. He and his wife, Lolita, have two daughters now in college. Lolita is a gourmet cook and helps sell the honey.

Now Oliver has beehives all around this area. His bees make honey in a dozen nearby locations, for example, in Burlingame, Tunitas Creek, and Bunker Hill. The hives are serviced twice a year by Oliver or one of his four landscaping employees. If you have a swarm of bees in your shed, spa, or garden, Oliver will remove them. The pesky bees will be relocated to one of his hives.

Although he uses a net to protect his face, Oliver has no problem handling bees. He has been stung hundreds of times, but says it doesn't really bother him. He uses no chemicals in controlling bees and only occasionally smoke.

You can buy honey labeled by hive location at Oliver's house on Lexington – please call ahead to 345-2008 or 345-4546. It's also available at the Crystal Springs Produce Market and sold in bulk to folks who peddle it at farmers markets. Some of our neighbors claim that a daily spoonful of Oliver's honey, which contains local pollen, can prevent allergic reactions to our trees and flowers.

Oliver's landscaping business serves landscape designers and architects. At his business location on Amphlett, he takes advantage of the warmer, windless weather, with no deer or gophers, to raise fruit trees, vegetables, and the gorgeous orchids that adorn his entry court.

With all this energetic activity, it's hard to see how Oliver can manage with the handicap of slowly progressive multiple sclerosis. He says it slows him down, but he deals with it. Perhaps it's his sense of humor that keeps him going. His next door neighbor, Bill Ainsley, joined us for the interview. They are such good friends that they went to Tahiti together in 1982. Bill tells the story of moving in next door to Oliver. The first day he received a nice potted plant. The next day Oliver came over with a rattlesnake in a pillowcase.
