Chamberlain Project Hearing Date Changed to April 13

The Board of Supervisors hearing to consider approval of the Chamberlain proposal will take place on April 13. With the support of our District One Supervisor Mark Church, community representatives have successfully worked with County staff on both the Conditions of Approval and the Conservation Easement related to the open space in the proposal. Supervisor Church firmly supports the goal of having all issues worked out in advance of the final Board of Supervisors hearing.

Community representatives have been allowed to work cooperatively with County Counsel on having full and appropriate protections in perpetuity for the open space parcel. A strong conservation easement protects both the best interest of the County and the Highlands area open space. Otherwise, loopholes and weak provisions in the conservation easement could make the open space vulnerable to the easement's disappearance along with the return of inappropriate development proposals of the kind we have struggled to prevent for 22 years. Our representatives have contributed significant changes that strengthen the conservation easement on behalf of County taxpayers as well as area communities.

At the Planning Commission hearing in February, we highlighted several remaining important issues in the protections, which we anticipate will be resolved with area community input. Our representatives continue to work to accomplish the necessary strong conservation easement. This is the last action that will be necessary to approve construction of 11 homes, and guarantee permanent protection of the remaining 93 acres. **Please attend the hearing on April 13.**

- I. Call to Order the meeting was called to order at 7:42 p.m. by President Rick Priola.

III. Sheriff's Department/ California Highway Patrol/CDF

Deputy Jake Trickett reported briefly on recent property crimes in the Highlands. Residents are reminded to lock their cars and avoid leaving valuables such as GPS devices in plain view. The Deputies will also be upping their patrols in the neighborhood at night and will increase traffic stops in the evenings.



Julia becomes consumed by the story of the 1942 roundup of Jews and of her husband's family's involvement in this event.

Unfortunately in our community one has to go to many different places to get rid of all of our things, but at least there is a home for nearly everything.


Goodwill, 28 West 25th Avenue, San Mateo

Buy Local from Family-Owned Stores

Two family-owned and operated stores that have recently opened nearby seem like neighbors. They also turn out to have healthy, sustainable products and fascinating personal backgrounds.

Mustafa Mutlu of Crystal Springs Produce fled his home in Bulgaria and the Communist regime there in 1989, when the border was opened for a brief time. The family was able to escape to Yugoslavia with their two children, ages 9 and 7. After 22 days of living in their car, they were accepted at a UN refugee camp. A year later the U.S. offered them asylum, with sponsorship by the International Rescue Committee, which supplied their airfare and rent for three months.

Mustafa washed cars, did valet parking, and finally drove a shuttle bus to SFO for 16 years. But they came from a small village in Bulgaria and missed the farm. So, with all the family ready to pitch in, they started a produce store on Polhemus six months ago. All three generations, including two small grandchildren, live together in San Mateo.

Now Mustafa starts at 4 a.m. at the produce market in South San Francisco for items that are not delivered from organic farms in Watsonville. In addition to a wide variety of fruits and vegetables, they stock many European and Middle Eastern specialties. Wife, daughter, and son-in-law, Aydin Kyazim, make up the entire staff.

Crystal Springs Fish and Poultry has reopened with new owners. Kevin manages the store, which sells fish, poultry, and now organic and free-range meats. His wife Yvette is a bit busy with their four children, but she does find time to make her special crab cakes.

Kevin was a chef for 19 years, after going to business school on the east coast. He learned cooking in Italy and both studied and taught at the California Culinary Academy. The store features fish from Half Moon Bay and San Francisco, picked up fresh every day, plus salmon from Loch Duart which is organic and sustainably farmed. They also offer Mary's free-range and organic chickens from Sanger, near Fresno.

Although the store's being closed for four months made it harder to start up again, in the 18 months since the Kinchens have owned it, their loyal customers have come back.

I enjoyed talking with our new "neighbors" and like both to support small business and buy local.
