We were pleased that Don Horsley was elected to fill Mark Church's seat on the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors, repre-

senting District 3 (our district). Don was very helpful to the Highlands when he was County Sheriff, and we expect our good relationship with him to continue. Although San Mateo County Supervisors must live in the districts they represent, they are elected countywide, and the winner has to receive a majority of the votes to avoid a runoff. Don's election proved that he had countywide support, and we congratulate him.

HCA Election: We've got another election coming up in November. It's for the 2011 HCA officers and board at the HCA meeting on November 23. Garbage and Recyclable Services: We all received notice in the mail from the County in October about the proposed rates for the collection of our garbage and recyclables starting Jan. 1. A public hearing on the rates

is scheduled for 9 a.m. on December 7, at the Board of Supervisors chambers in Redwood City. The new rates appear to be an increase of about \$2 a month above our current rates, but there will also be increased service, with recyclables as well as garbage collected weekly. You can find information about the rates online at either www.RecycleWorks.org or http://www.co.sanmateo.ca.us/portal/site/publicworks. The new weekly service begins the first week in January. ## How to Outsmart the Raccoons

The new garbage cans have gained instant popularity among our friendly neighborhood raccoons: they are easy to turn over and open

for a night snack. As Forest Gump said about a box of chocolate, "You never know what you're gonna' get."Nor do the raccoons, but they keep checking! They have also decided that the Aadahls have the best garbage in the immediate neighborhood, judging from the

frequency of their visits

However, if feeding raccoons is not your thing, there is an easy solution to avoid having to sweep up the remnants after a nightly feast. Just drill a hole in the front lip of the lid and tie a strong rubber band, like a bungee rope, to it. Then hook the other end to the pipe that is attached to the front wall of the can. Select a length that makes for a tight hold when stretched and hooked over the pipe. An additional benefit is that you don't need to touch the lid if

you dump something into the container. Just grab the rope, disengage the hook, and lift the lid by the rope with one hand, while dumping your stuff with the other, before rehooking the elastic rope. I'm sure the garbage collectors will appreciate the rope being disengaged before pickup. Sorry, raccoons! You are cute - but you have to learn to clean up after yourselves before we can leave the lid unlocked for you!




