San Bruno Fire -- It Could Happen to Us

On the evening of Thursday, September 9, hundreds of lives were changed by a massive explosion in a San Bruno neighborhood. Just before 6:30 p.m., a 30-inch gas line exploded beneath the ground, and massive flames were sent shooting up in the air, reaching as high as 100 feet. The explosion and resulting fire killed four people, left three missing and presumed dead, destroyed 37 homes, damaged many more, and left a close-knit neighborhood looking like a war zone.

This disaster is a huge wake-up call for the Peninsula. A tragedy like this could happen absolutely

anywhere; the question is: are you prepared? What would you do if you suddenly had no power? How would you communicate with your loved ones if cell phone towers were down? Do you know where the gas shut-off valve is located in your house? Would you know whether it was safe to enter your neighbor's burning house when you hear cries for help?

Once a disaster strikes, it's far too late to prepare yourself. The Highlands Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program, in conjunction with CalFire, is offering CERT training classes to help our neighbors to prepare for disasters like the San Bruno fire.

The CERT program educates participants about preparedness for the kinds of hazards that may impact our area and trains them in basic disaster response skills such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations.

Although the San Bruno fire was a horrible tragedy, it was contained in a specific area. Experts say that there is a 62% chance of an earthquake of a magnitude of 6.7 or higher in the next 30 years. If it should happen, emergency service providers will be overloaded and might not be able to get to you immediately. You need to be able to take care of yourself and help your neighbors until emergency services are available. CERT training is the first step to preparing yourself and your family for disaster, and it's FREE!

Fall is here, and we haven't had much of the warm Indian summer weather that we always look forward to. On the other hand, we also haven't had much of the very hot winds that can create fire danger during our dry months, so I'm not complaining. The terrible explosion and fire in San

Bruno bring home to us how quickly a pleasant, peaceful neighborhood can suddenly become a scene of destruction and pain.

Our Highlands CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) training, coordinated by the Rec Center in conjunction with CalFire, helps prepare neighbors to respond to emergencies of all kinds. It's a coincidence that the next training session begins in October, so soon after the San Bruno emergency. This is training we could all use. See the story on page 1 for details about the program and how to enroll.

Drive Safely: In every September *lowdown*, we remind people that school has started, and it's more important than ever to drive carefully, obey the speed limit, and keep an eye out for children, bikes, and walkers of all species. Those Highlanders who drive up the hill on Ticonderoga got a taste of what speeding can do last month when they saw a smashed-up parked car with a wheel that had been pushed up to the side of a rear window by a speeder.

Road Closure: In July we wrote that in August Skyline Blvd. would be closed between the south-bound exit from Highway 280 and the intersection with Crystal Springs Road while repairs (expected to last more than three years) were made on the Crystal Springs Dam—and then the plans changed! The closing now will take place at the end of September, so we will soon have to use alternate routes to Sawyer Camp Road.

Other road work will also affect us. Signs directing drivers to detours for entering Highway 92 are still covered up as this message is being written, but may be in effect by the time you read it, so keep an eye out for them.

Halloween: On a more cheerful note, we can all look forward to Halloween next month and the clever decorations and costumes that come with it. Our neighborhood is very children-friendly, so be prepared.

Pacchetti Sisters Create a Restaurant in 24 Hours

Twenty-four hours to create a restaurant? That's the incredible challenge faced by sisters Lisa Sheehan and Barbie Apt when they appeared on the Food Network's weekly 24 Hour Restaurant Battle in July, competing with another team of two to design, outfit, staff, and open a restaurant in 24 hours.

Daughters of Allegheny residents Marge and Ted Pacchetti, the girls were raised in the Highlands and began working in restaurants in their teens. Barbie is a graduate of the Culinary Institute of America, and Lisa has managed several restaurants.

Though neither now works in the field. Barbie has been a chef and both sisters have been involved in opening restaurants and have worked with very well-known restaurateurs. Both live in Texas with their families.

In the contest, each competing pair was given \$4,000, warehouse space, and 24 hours to turn it into a restaurant, complete with staff, decor, furniture, linens, tableware, a menu and food. All the kitchen equipment was provided by the network.

To get the work done, the girls divided the task, with Lisa in charge of the front of the house and Barbie running the back. The network provided the necessary staff. Inspired by their father Ted who had always wanted to open a restaurant with music, they used his initials (TAP) to name their restaurant "Taps, a Modern Tavern and Piano Bar."

It was a totally exhausting but exhilarating experience, and despite some minor glitches, they got the job done in 24 hours. Their reward was spectacular! The judges named them the winners of the competition and awarded them a \$10,000 prize. The Highlands cheering section is still basking in the glow.


